

## COPYRIGHT PROCEDURES

### Part A COPYRIGHT CONTACTS

#### 1. Liturgical Texts

Copyright on excerpts from the *Sacramentary* or one of the ritual books is held by the International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL).

Parishes preparing a service booklet for weddings, funerals or other sacramental Celebrations who use any ICEL texts (e.g. opening prayers, Gloria) are not required to write for permission.

Acknowledgment should be provided, however, for example:

Excerpts from the English Translation of the *Roman Missal c.1973*.

#### 2. Scripture Texts

According to the Churches' Copyright Directory (London, Stainer & Bell, 1992) extracts up to 500 words from the *Jerusalem Bible* translation in the *Australian Lectionary* (London: Collins Liturgical/Geoffrey Chapman 1981) can be used with the following acknowledgement:

#### 3. Psalms

Gratis permission is given to parishes to use the responsorial psalms in worship aids for one time use. The acknowledgement required is:

#### 4. Liturgical Music

Copyright on the text, melody and arrangement of liturgical music is normally indicated either at the end of a piece of music, or, in the case of a hymnal, within a section of copyright acknowledgements at the back of the collection. To reproduce these for liturgical use, permission is required from the appropriate copyright holder or their local agent.

## **Part B MUSIC COPYRIGHT LICENCES**

Two main agencies:

### ***1. Word of Life International***

Publishers permitted to copy:

GIA, OCP, McCrimmon, NALR Publications, Weston Priory Publications, Wild Goose Publications, Willow Connection, World Library Publications and many more.

Licenses available include Restricted Copy License for reproducing music on overheads or service booklets, a Religious Music Copyright License for reproducing music for musicians and a one-time use License for one-off occasions. ### ***2. LicenSing***

This is a more recent agency, which has 2 types of licenses.

A basic licence which covers all activities of the Church and a Special Licence covering diocesan one-off events. A unique feature of licensing is access to copyright cleared on a time-limited basis in their magazine *Update*. This contains 40 songs and hymns each quarter based on the Lectionary Readings. *LicenSing* copyright holders include: Desert Flower Music, Franciscan Communications Co., GIA Publications, Hope Publishing Hymns, NLMC Publications, Ancient and Modern Jubilate Hymns, NLMC Publication, Open Book Publishers, OCP Slaine and Bell, Wild Goose, Willow Connection, to name but a few. ## **Part C DISPLAYING PERMISSIONS**

Copyright licences require overheads, song sheets and service booklets to display copyright permissions. Acknowledgements should be worded in accordance with the licence agreement. For example, on overheads include the title, author and composer and, at the base of the text/music, copyright date, copyright holder, and where applicable, Australian agent, *All rights reserved; Used with permission*, and the licence number. Acknowledgements in booklets can be included beneath individual items, or grouped collectively at the end.

## **Part D ANNUAL SURVEY FORMS**

Copyright licences require a record of parish usage for a period of time, indicating which works have been sung, how many times and the average size of your congregation. It is necessary to indicate if you have made a photocopy or exact replica of the music/words and write the name of the hymnbook or publisher from which you made your photocopy.

## **Part E HYMNS IN PUBLIC DOMAIN**

Public musical works generally remain in copyright for a period of 50 years after the end of the year in which the composer died. Following this, they pass into what is described as *public domain (or out of copyright)*. Provided the original composer/text writer /an arranger retains the copyright until their death, copyright ownership passes to their heirs.

## **Part F COPYRIGHT ON PUBLISHED WORK**

The copyright on a published edition lasts for 25 years after the end of the year of publication. This means that even though the text or tune may be out of copyright, there can still be copyright on a published edition.
