## SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME [Year C] Sunday 13 February, 2022

First Reading: Jeremiah 17:5-8 A curse on those who trust in humanity; a blessing on those who trust in the Lord.

**Responsorial Psalm:** Happy are they who hope in the Lord.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20 If Christ is not raised from the dead, your faith is in vain. Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, Alleluia! Rejoice and be glad; your reward is great in heaven. Alleluia!

**Gospel:** Luke 6:17, 20-26 Happy are the poor. Woe to the rich!

Shuggie Bain, lives in a bedsit in Glasgow with his mother, Agnes and brother Leek and sister Catherine. In the early eighties with the collapse of the mining and high unemployment, Agnes leaves with her children and Shug, her man, to begin a new life. Shortly after Shug leaves her she sinks back into her alcoholism. She tries to fight the demons in her life but fails. Halfway through the book she gives away the alcohol and things start to look more positive for them all. Catherine has already married and left to begin a new life in South Africa because she could no longer stay with her mother and her struggles. Leek leaves when Agnes returns again to alcoholism and Leek cannot face it any longer. Shuggie remains to try to find a way out of the spiraling hold that drinking has on his mother. He simply wants to love her and to find the person that loves him back. He dreams of being a hairdresser but lacks the self-esteem to achieve his dream.

You know by three quarters of the book that it is not going to have a happy ending. It makes you want them to find happiness and to achieve their goals in life. Yet deep down you just know it's not going to end that way. I have 30 pages left to read, I feel like I have been putting off finding out what happens. But you know it's not going to be the brightest ending. The book was written by Douglas Stuart and it is noted as being semiautobiographic in nature. Whilst it is not his life story, he experienced many of these similar struggles having grown up in the tough mining male dominant Glasgow of the eighties, homosexual, not welcomed, with an alcoholic mother, seen as a little odd and he wanted to be a hairdresser. In a lot of ways he is Shuggie. It is not a light read – it is gritty, realistic and challenging – at times sad and other times filled with hope and love.

When I read todays gospel I was thinking about the people hearing Jesus for the first time. People who probably thought that having lived three quarters of their short life, they were pretty sure they knew how it was going to end – much the way it always was – oppressed, poor, unwanted, outcasts and so on. Then along comes this Jesus guy who suddenly opens their eyes to give them some hope. Jesus invites them to see that whatever is happening in their lives it is not the end. You will be part of God's Kingdom, you will laugh, you will not hunger, and God is with you in those difficult times where people persecute you – God has not abandoned you!! So open your eyes and see anew a God who gives you HOPE.

How does God bring you the gift of hope? Who carries the flame of hope for you? Where to you experience a God who Have a blessed week, Fr. Michael will never abandon you?

For those with a gardening flair, you will notice the new trees at the front of the Cathedral and those in the grounds. The two directly in front of the Cathedral are Crimson Spires, the two either side are Capitol Pear. The new trees in the grassed areas, clockwise from the corner on Neil and James are Jacaranda, Prunus, Crepe Myrtle, existing Callistemon, Crepe Myrtle, Cape Chestnut and finally the existing Melaleuca tree.
