14th Sunday in Ordinary Time [Year A] Sunday 5th July, 2020

First Reading: Zechariah 9:9-10 See how humbly your king come to you!

Responsorial Psalm: I will praise your name forever, my King and my God. [Psalm 144] **Second Reading:** Romans 8:9, 11-13 If by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body, you will live.

Gospel Acclamation: ALLELUIA! ALLELUIA! Blessed are you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, you have

revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom. ALLELUIA! Gospel: Matthew 11:25-30 I am gentle and humble of heart.

Next weekend we begin Masses for 100 people. It will be the same system as before – registered on arrival and allocated a number which will be all you need for subsequent Masses, as a master register will be kept. Once 100 have arrived the doors will be closed with our apologies, however it is what the law requires. Saturday 6pm, Sunday 7am, 9am and 5.30pm will all resume as from 11th/12th July. We are all looking forward to reconnecting with you all.

The 9am will continue to be live streamed.

Living the Christian life can be hard. At times it involves fasting, giving money to the poor, spending time in prayer instead of vegetating in front of the TV, going to Mass instead of sleeping in, reading the Scriptures, confessing one's sins, apologising to others, forgiving serious hurts, being generous with our time, being compassionate to people who may not seem to deserve it, upholding a strict morality, and the list goes on... In short, being a Christian entails going against the grain and, at times, putting one's neck out socially before a culture that is often hostile to this faith. Jesus always maintained that it would be difficult. In fact, he explicitly said that in order to have life, we must take the narrow gate and the hard road that very few people take (Matt 7:13-14). He also stipulates that a follower of his must deny themselves, take up their cross and follow him (Matt 16:24).

Every Catholic, I'm sure, is aware of the hardships of living the Christian life. So, what are we to make of this Sunday's Gospel? "Come to me all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yoke and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. Yes, my yoke is easy and my burden light." These words can feel troubling when we find ourselves up to our necks in disappointment, affliction, hardship and weariness because of our faith. Yet if we do feel a certain pinch or tension regarding this passage and its seeming contradiction with reality, then I think we've taken a good first step towards realising what Christianity really is.

Notice what else Jesus says in today's Gospel: "No one knows the Son except the Father, just as no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him." The full biblical sense of "to know", carries a deep sense of intimacy and union. So here Jesus speaks of the profound unity and intimacy that exists between him and God the Father, and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him. Only after uttering these words as part of his prayer to the Father, does Jesus then look to those around him and say "come to me all you who labour and are overburdened..." In other words, when Jesus looks around at his disciples, he invites them to enter into the *intimacy* and *union* that exists between him and the Father. It is there and there alone that we will find rest for our souls. It is there, in that communion, that the yoke we shoulder (the cross) becomes good to bear and the burden of living the Christian life becomes light. It is there alone that our souls can find rest, eternally restless as they are until they rest in him.

My brothers and sisters, living the Christian life is hard. It entails many challenges and practices that are sometimes inconvenient. But ultimately, being a Catholic is about entering into a relationship of intimacy and union with the risen Christ himself. It is *through* him and *with* him and *in* him alone that all manner of hardships and sufferings find their proper meaning, become fruitful, and can even feel sweet to bear.
