The Miracle of the Weeds that became Wheat

There is great wisdom in todays gospel...as you would expect! It has been my experience in life that what we sometimes think at first are the weeds, sometimes turn out to be closer to the wheat then we initially thought. In other words given time and circumstances some people surprise us in our relationships with them. Their response of kindness to certain events move our hearts and they no longer look like the weeds in the field. So maybe there is a great wisdom in not pulling up the weeds immediately! A number of years ago I was a priest involved with a school that had a "Behaviour Policy" that had levels, so level 1 being the top and level 7 resulting in suspension. Most students found themselves on level 1 -3, with some students wavering on 3 and 4. Awards were presented on assembly for those students achieving a high behavior level. The practice is understandable encouraging good behaviour. At a staff meeting a motion was put forward to determine that only those on level three or higher could run for any senior leadership position. Good way to pull out the weeds! As you can imagine I was not happy with this idea. It made me think that what if a student feels unaccepted at school, put down at home, lacking friends, and then this is reinforced by being told they cannot run for a leadership position. My thinking was, "What if leadership was the making of the student?" We would never find out if they were actually wheat hidden amongst the weeds. Thankfully the idea was put to rest. Makes you think though, what might happen if we are quick to pull up the weeds because at a certain time we are sure that's what they are. We would say it's impossible to change weeds into wheat, but wasn't Jesus into miracles – maybe we should be too! Let the wind of the Holy Spirit blow and bring change. I finish with another little story from the Jesuit Anthony De Mello. "A man who took great pride in his lawn found himself with a large crop of dandelions. He tried every method he knew to destroy them. Still they plagued him. Finally he wrote to the Department of Agriculture. He enumerated all the things he had tried and closed his letter with "What shall I do now?" In due course the reply came: "We suggest you learn to love them".....So learning to love them was no easy task. I began by talking to them each day. Cordial. Friendly. They maintained a sullen silence. They were smarting after the war I had waged against them – they were suspicious of my motives. But the day came when they smiled.

And relaxed.

And we started to be friends.

My lawn, of course was ruined. But how attractive my garden became!
