

Gospel: John 20:1-9 The teaching of scripture is That he must rise from the dead.

There is an old World War One story of the soldier making his way back through the muddy fields of the Somme and as he trudges along he notices a helmet and decides to take it home as a sad souvenir. When he lifts the helmet he discovers a man's head underneath and more than that he is alive and blinks at him as the light enters his eyes. The man starts to desperately dig him out. The buried man says, "I wouldn't bother mate, I'm still on me 'orse!" A silly story, sure, but one that reminds us that the more we dig the more we will find. Easter is exactly like that! Easter is about the promise of NEW LIFE. Every death – actual of figuratively – reveals a new pathway – a new direction - a new life. Even if that new life frightens us for a time - even if like the disciples we run away for a time. Jesus calls us back to know he is always with us - BE NOT AFRAID. Easter reminds us that every "death" - here and now - or as we enter the world beyond - leads us into the closer presence of Christ. Be still and know I am with you. Blessings at Easter, Fr. Michael

Hosanna to Alleluia - what a journey! Holy Week is loaded with ideas, thoughts, and revelations - sorrows and comforts. Every year, my involvement in the celebrations look different. But always, the same anticipation and wonder remain.

Why did Jesus Die? (A few reflections inspired by a Sydney Priest – Geoff Plant in his commentary on Luke's Gospel). St Paul sees the willingness of Jesus to accept death as the opening of a new and sure way to understand and approach God: willingly accepting death Jesus offers all that He is and has as a complete act of love for others. Love of self, of one's own comfort, one's own survival ... these are the ultimate barriers to the complete LOVING of others.

Jesus holds nothing back for himself.

Paul uses other images – Jesus' dying, freely accepted, shows in a stunning way how deeply and completely God LOVES all people.

Jesus' final act of selfless love draws to a climax all the other actions of His ministry -

† touching and healing of the man with leprosy. † His tears at the grave of Lazarus. † His tenderness towards the sick and broken ones. † His spontaneous and complete forgiveness of sinners. † His total acceptance of outcasts.

The best way to prepare for our own dying is to spend our life giving it away to others. That's the way of Jesus! Hal Ranger

Where is the love? this is one of the songs from Black Eyed Peas that I liked. The lyrics of the song ask questions that linger in our hearts during moments when life weighs heavily on us or when we witness injustices unfolding around us. Contemplate the scene of Jesus on the cross saying, "My God, my God why have you forsaken me?" Even he experienced feelings of abandonment and isolation. Amidst his despair, love remained present. Notwithstanding the harshness and animosity surrounding him, there were opportunities for love. Mary, John, and a few devoted women stood actively by his side at the crucifixion. A repentant thief sought Jesus' mercy. Joseph of Arimathea courageously requested his body for burial. Nicodemus brought spices for his funeral rites. Even Pilate recognized the injustice. Desired to lose him free. These gestures may appear to be of minor importance compared to the brutality of crucifixion; however, they held importance. They exemplified how love can radiate in moments of darkness. As followers of Christ, we desire to emulate Christ's love. We are called to regard others with empathy accompany them without passing judgment and offer solace to those swallowed up in despair. This Easter season let us welcome the love exemplified by Christ's resurrection. Let us sow seeds of hope throughout our communities. Love is more than a word. It's a way of living. It involves empathy, compassion and insight into other's lives. It's, about embodying the spirit of selflessness much like Jesus did when he made the sacrifice for us. Let's recall the teachings from John 13;34 35; "A new command I give you; Love one another. As I have loved you so you must love one another. By this, everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another." May this Easter season bring warmth and optimism to your hearts. Wishing blessings upon all of you.
