REMEMBERING all those who lived before us

At the beginning of November each year and in many traditions throughout November we are invited to revisit the lives of family members, friends and occasional companions whose lives we have shared.

What we have and who we are today flows from the gifts and experiences we have inherited from those who have been "companions on our journey" and ancestors to whom, through God, we owe our lives. So these are days of thanksgiving, days of re-visiting their life stories, re-living their struggles, successes and decisions, their heroic goodness and their failures.

Every one of them, like every of us was a saint and a sinner.

I invite you, in these days, to find a quiet place and do some <u>remembering</u>: literally re-living, re-claiming the names of family, friends and companions on your life's journey. Recall their gifts, their influence, words of inspiration and encouragement, the hurts and disappointments associated (and still "alive"!) within your heart and memory. Do this in the faith and knowledge that the living God of truth, faithful love and mercy was and is touching your life through all of them. **Then talk with God about all of this.**

The final sentences of St Luke's Gospel record a conversation about life and death, memories and questions, the past present and future. Two followers of Jesus have decided after His death to go back to where they came from and begin again; there's a suggestion in the report that many hopes and dreams they had developed now seemed to be dashed by his death. It seemed to be "All over"!

As they walked the eleven kilometres from Jerusalem to their home village of Emmaus they are joined by a stranger who encourages them to talk more openly about their experiences of life and death ... what actually happened, what they thought should have happened, their hopes and their regrets. This expanded conversation, entered into in the light of the Sacred Writings that were the foundation of their Faith, brought new light and understandings about life and death. They began to see the bigger picture, especially when they invited the stranger to share a meal with them.

So I invite you, in these coming days, to <u>expand</u> your remembering, your sharing of stories and experiences about the saints and sinners of your family history to include current family members and friends.

In the sacredness of this remembering <u>together</u> we will, both within our family community, come to experience anew the Presence of God – profound love, mercy and new life!
