OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE – Year C Saturday 23 November/Sunday 24 November 2019 Readings this weekend:

First Reading: 2 Samuel 5:1-3 Responsorial Psalm: Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord. [Psalm 121] Second Reading: Colossians 1:12-20 Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Blessed is he who inherits the kingdom of David our father; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 22:35-43 [Story of the Good Thief]

Recently I completed the first book of a trilogy, originally written in 1995, called "Northern Lights", part of the "His Dark Materials Trilogy" by Philip Pullman. Some may remember the movie, "The Golden Compass", which was from this first book. HBO has just launched a mini-series of the trilogy. It's an intriguing fantasy story of a little girl Lyra, aged 12, who is the key to finding the solution to what is happening and will end up being the hero of the story – much like just about every fantasy book I've read! However the way her character has been portrayed is interesting. Each person who lives in this place has a dæmon connected to them. A dæmon is an animal that reflects the person's core character and will be the best companion for them throughout life. This dæmon talks to them giving them advice and assistance, however they are also a source of vulnerability – for it your dæmon dies, then so do you, this is the intimate connection that is both gift and curse. The actual animal changes until a certain age and then it remains the same once life has chosen a path for the person, and their true character is revealed!

When I connected this to the upcoming period of Advent it made me wonder what animal would God choose for me as companion and assistant? Of course it is a totally philosophical question and one that perhaps opens a little window of reflection. It also invites us into a space that gets us to consider – what is my core character trait? – Why did I choose that particular animal? – What is it saying about me and the way I see myself in the world? It is simply a bit of fun, but it's interesting how different analogies and inner traits are mirrored back to us when we take the time to use this as a tool for reflection and meditation.

Last week I had the privilege to celebrate the Year 12 Graduation Mass at St. Ursula's. This particular class, when they began High School in Year 8 reflected on a symbol for their year which they would take with them throughout their schooling time. They chose the Hummingbird. At the Mass they reflected on the reasons for this choice:

"Hummingbirds are among the smallest of all birds. Their incredible aerobatics means that they can fly up, down, backward and they can change direction in an instant and effortlessly shift from full speed to practically standing still in the blink of an eye. This is in part because of how light-weight they are, with some hummingbirds weighing no more than a 10 cent piece. May this remind us of our power of adaptability...being willing to step back, observe, look at things from a new perspective, and then quickly shift into action as needed. Their physical lightness is also a beautiful reminder for us too, to lighten up! If we let ourselves release the weight of doubt, fear and worry...like the hummingbird, our spirits can begin to hover and soar as we follow our path of joy. The way that hummingbirds hover is very symbolic in and of life itself – because they move their wings in a figure eight pattern – the symbol of infinity! In this, the hummingbird has a special way of teaching us to move beyond time, to heal what has happened in the past, and to fully center our presence and awareness in the moment that is now. We must remember that God's love for us is infinite and that God accompanies us on our journey. May our hearts light up and help us to transcend perceived barriers and limitations to awaken our spirituality as infinite spiritual beings created in the image and likeness of God. The hummingbirds drink from the nectar of flowers....they are always searching for the sweetness of life, teaching us to do the same. The humble hummingbird has much to teach us: **be a nectar collector and be sure to sip** the sweet moments \mathscr{G} let your true colours glow \mathscr{G} don't get your feathers ruffled over the little things, be adaptable and agile \mathscr{T} be messengers of hope and jubilation \mathscr{T} to let our hearts be filled with the infinite love of the spirit \mathscr{T} " Have a wonderful hope filled week, Fr.
