## THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME [Year C] Sunday 23 January, 2022

First Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-6,8-10 They read from the book of law and they understood what was read.

Responsorial Psalm: Your words, Lord, are spirit and life.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-30 Together you are Christ's body, but each of you are a different part of it.

Gospel Acclamation: ALLELUIA! ALLELUIA! The Lord sent me to bring Good News to the poor and freedom to prisoners. ALLELUIA!

Gospel: Luke 11-4; 4:14-21 The scriptures were fulfilled on this day.

As you would know earlier in January the Bishop and most of the priests spent a week at Santa Theresa, Ormiston on retreat. The environment was beautiful with views overlooking the bay, two doors down from the Carmelite Convent, which sadly has closed it chapel and grounds to the public from 2019 due to Covid. The retreat director was Bishop Emeritus Eugene Hurley, retired Bishop of Darwin. It was the typical modern day retreat, Bishop Eugene came to us via zoom! Thankfully the technology worked perfectly – a miracle in itself!

The beginning point of the retreat, and the place which Bishop Eugene returned often to, was the simple premise in life that the way we see things (events, people, places, experiences, tasks) determine how we will react or respond to them. I guess a simple example that he gave was that if we priests, see writing a homily a chore, then in some way it will come across like that, however if we see it as an opportunity of bringing joy and hope and God's love into people's lives through our own lived faith, then the outcome will be different. So sometimes the question we need to ask ourselves is, "How do we see?" and do we need to change the perception of the way we view some things, so our response will be different?

I was reflecting on this when considering today's gospel. This story of Jesus unrolling the scroll in the synagogue on the Sabbath day. He speaks of healing, freedom and release from burdens in this year of God's favour. If we see or hear this gospel of something that Jesus had the power to do – perform miracles, bring about social change and so on, then they might as well be simply words on a page and our reaction is one of admiration of Jesus, but inaction in our time. However if it is the end of the gospel that we see as the place of our response, then the first part comes alive for us. "This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen."

So when Jesus speaks of blind with new sight, our response relates to TODAY – do we need to see things differently, giving everyone the right to their own opinion and point of view? Can we bring a word of encouragement to uplift "to bring good news to the poor"? Do we have the courage to gently move people to see life more positively through our love and compassion? Are we able to give "liberty" to those we hold "captive" due to our judgments or assumptions? Can we have the courage to forgive those who we have "downtrodden" or been "downtrodden" by?

If we can, then we are seeing with eyes that want to respond in the current world and times. Our "seeing" is transformed and our response is enlightened.

May the God inspire in us a way of seeing that brings new life to all, to bring a year of God's favour.
