TWELFTHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME [Year B] Sunday 20th June, 2021

First Reading: Job 38:1, 8-11 Here I have set the boundaries of the sea. **Responsorial Psalm:** Give thanks to the Lord, his love is everlasting. **Second Reading:** 2 Corinthians 5:14-17. All things are made new.

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia! A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people. Alleluia! Gospel: Mark 4:35-41. Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B

Why do bad things happen to good people? Why do bad things happen at all? If God is good and just, why so much needless suffering? These are age old questions which every generation must grapple with. The Bible is no exception, and we see this above all in the Book of Job, of which we are given a short snippet in our first reading today. A little bit of context might help: Job was a good man. In fact, Job was the *best* man (Job 1:8), one who was blameless and upright, one who feared God and turned away from evil (Job 1:1). Yet God permits Satan to afflict Job, first by taking away his family and his possessions, and finally by afflicting his health. To begin with, Job responds in a remarkable show of faith by blessing God and acknowledging that we must be willing to accept suffering from God's hand, since we readily accept his blessings. But after his own flesh is afflicted with disease, Job begins to lament. His friends come to counsel him, suggesting that he must have sinned in order for this to happen. Job responds, justifying himself, arguing his innocence and proclaiming his own righteousness. This is where things go wrong. The moment Job begins to believe in his own righteousness, he is lead to territory that may be familiar to many of us. He begins to blame and question the ways of God, suggesting that God must be unjust. How often do we do this when suffering touches our life?

The Lord responds to Job, but remarkably, the Lord doesn't justify himself. God doesn't explain anything. God doesn't try to convince Job. The Lord doesn't need to. Who is Job to think that God owes him anything? The Lord simply responds with a series of questions: "where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth?" "Who determined its measurements—surely you know!" "Who pent up the sea behind closed doors when it leapt tumultuous out of the womb, when I wrapped it in a robe of mist..." The Lord then goes on a lengthy series of questions regarding the intricate mysteries of the universe, probing Job's competence to answer them. At the end, Job responds in a telling way:

"I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (Job 42:5-6).

By the end of the book of Job, one is left with a twofold sense. First, perhaps a slight disappointment. It doesn't answer our questions! But then there is a sense of a deeper answer lying somewhere between a feeling of one's smallness, and the absolute grandeur and sovereignty of God. A feeling of having been humbled, perhaps. A sense that things are the way they are, simply because they are. The world has its own wild and dangerous ordered freedom, we are part of that world and human beings have the freedom to make choices. In the midst of all this, things don't go the way we want them to. We get hurt. But this is the precise moment of importance. It is the moment I remember that I am not in control. I am not absolute. The world doesn't revolve around me. God doesn't owe me anything. Here in the dust of suffering, my heart is in the right place to truly worship, truly adore, truly need, and truly live knowing what I am before the almighty.
