EASTER SUNDAY [Year B] Sunday 4TH April, 2021

First Reading: Acts 10:34, 37-43 We have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead.
Responsorial Psalm: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad.
Second Reading: Colossians 3:1-4 Look for the things that are in heaven, where Christ is.
Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! Christ has become our paschal sacrafice; let us feast with joy in the Lord. Alleluia!

Gospel: John 20:1-9 The teaching of scripture is that he must rise from the dead. I HAVE RISEN AND I AM WITH YOU STILL ALLELUIA!! TOO WONDERFUL THIS KNOWLEDGE ALLELUIA! HAPPY EASTER FROM EVERYONE AT ST PATRICK'S – Bishop Robert, Priests and Staff!!

At the Easter Vigil, the ancient *Exultet* exhorts us: "Be glad, let earth be glad, as glory floods her, ablaze with light from her eternal King, let all corners of the earth be glad, knowing an end to gloom and darkness."

These words have proclaimed the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ throughout the world for most of the Church's history. Perhaps they seem particularly strange in our day, as we find "all corners of the earth" in turmoil, seemingly knowing no end to "gloom and darkness"? Each year the experience of the Easter Vigil itself never ceases to provide a response to this reality: As the flame of the paschal candle is brought into the Church and enthroned in our midst, it flickers and dances as it pushes back the vast darkness around it. If you stand a long way off from the flame, it will indeed appear insignificant and perhaps even overcome by the gloom. But if you come close enough to it, you begin to see. Our own faces become illumined by the warm glow of that light and the darkness appears insignificant. It seems to me, dear brothers and sisters, that while the world may be shrouded in much darkness this Easter, those who come close to Christ our light will indeed know an end to gloom and darkness and be touched by that gladness which He alone can provide. My prayer for each of you this Easter is that you strive to come close to Jesus, crucified and risen, and that you be touched with the soft glow of his joy and peace.

The answer should be your current age! Well, I'm no mathematician, so I have no idea how that works, but it does! I'm sure there is some formula that explains it, but if I knew that then it would lose its mystery, so I don't bother to think about the intricacies of how it is done. We miss the point too with the resurrection if try to reason what happened. The book I am reading at the moment is titled, "A Traveller

at the Gates of Wisdom", by an Irish author, John Boyne. He traces history from Rome 1AD to the modern times through the telling of stories that share a connection. The premise of his story telling is that "Some stories are universal. They play out across human history. And time is the river which will will flow through them all." It takes quite a mind shift to realise that it is not the people in the novel that are central, but rather the story that is being unravelled itself through time. So attention is given to the story, the characters become the carriers of the message, but

the message (the story) stands alone. <u>TODAY</u>, we become not only the carriers of the story of the resurrection, but we become the message and the meaning that has been flowing through time – we become the river that weaves the *truth* into the world of today. Let our cry be **ALLELUIA**! Christ is Risen – **YOU** HAVE RISEN TO NEW LIFE.

May God indeed bless your Easter journey. Fr. Michael
